Differences

Las Vegas: located in Nevada Broadway: located in New York

Wall Street / Rikers Island

Similarities

Many drugs available
Convicted felons
Many business deals of a shady nature
Open day and night
Sexual deprivation and/or lack of exercise, leading to...
Bad Skin
Lots of tension, leading to...
Very bad manners

Differences

Wall Street: power ties; increasing numbers of women Rikers Island: no powers ties; few women

Painting by Julian Schnabel / Your Grandmother's Basement

Similarities

Old, broken crockery Flaking paint Bits of fur and antlers

Differences

Schnabel: mentioned in *New York*; priced at \$60,000; owned by rich folks Basement: not mentioned in *New York*; worthless; owned by Grandma

A Shot of Jack Daniel's at the Oak Bar (59th & Fifth) / A Shot of Jack Daniel's at Rudy's (45th & Ninth)

Similarities

About one ounce

Differences

Oak Bar: costs \$5.75; long walk to toilet; the person you're sitting next to is just visiting town to close a deal; lousy conversation

Rudy's: costs \$2.00; the toilets are very close by; the person you're sitting next to has been there since 1943; dialogue straight out of *The Iceman Cometh*

Metropolitan Opera / New York City Opera

Similarities

Lincoln Center location Vulgar décor Very large people shouting

Differences

The Met: *Parsifal, Wozzeck*; tickets are \$75 a pop; many slightly overweight, asexual men who've been buying subscriptions for *years*; Luciano Pavarotti sings there

NYC Opera: *South Pacific, Kismet*; tickets are \$32 a pop; lots of tourists; Tony Roberts sings there

Lexington Avenue IRT / New Calvary Cemetery, Queens

Similarities

Underground
Dark
Overcrowded
Costs to get in
Death all around you

Differences

IRT: moves, sometimes

New Calvary Cemetery: does not move at all

Ed Koch / An Old Tire

Similarities

No hair Roundness, rubberiness Avoid the topic of sexuality around election time Physically unappealing

Differences

Ed Koch: lives at Gracie Mansion on the East River; Democrat; Jewish; irritating, nasal

voice

Old Tire: floats in the East River; unaffiliated; Baptist; no voice

MoMA / A Hair Ball

Similarities

No similarities

Differences

MoMA: made of steel, concrete and art

Hair ball: made of hair; has not, as of this writing, sold its air rights

Similarities

Differences
